


We're pleased to report that the September meeting was well attended with 40-50 members and guests on hand to enjoy the evening. It was also nice to welcome 5 brand new members.

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### Guest Speaker - The Main Event!

Joanne Hoffman's talk, ***Quilting With Plants in Mind*** was enthusiastically received by an attentive audience. She did a terrific job of drawing parallels between the creativity used in quilting and that of garden and arrangement design. An enthusiastic gardener herself, she was able to bridge the topics effectively.

It turns out that quite a few of our members have a keen interest in quilting. I can recognize that a bed covering is a quilt, but that's about it. However Joanne's presentation was very interesting even for those in attendance who had no experience in quilting. Many were astonished by the complexity of the work and in the design and colour parallels with gardening.

The CPDHS Climate Change and Biodiversity special interest group organized a Native Plant Giveaway. Several examples of two dozen native plant species ready for fall planting, were given away to enthusiastic members and guests



All were 'winter-sown' over the 2023-2024 winter by CPDHS member Irene Tobis, and prepared for giveaway by members of the CPDHS Climate Change and Biodiversity interest group, as part of their mission to interest more of us in growing more native plants. Here's a list of the plants that were provided:

Agastache scrophulariifolia - Purple Giant Hyssop  
Anaphalis margaritacea - Pearly Everlasting  
Aquilegia canadensis - Eastern Red Columbine  
Asclepias incarnata - Swamp Milkweed (Rose Milkweed)  
Asclepias tuberosa - Butterfly Milkweed (Orange Milkweed)  
Clematis virginiana - Virgin's Bower  
Coreopsis lanceolata - Lance-leaved Tickseed  
Eutrochium maculatum - Spotted Joe Pye Weed  
Geum rivale - Water Avens  
Geum triflorum - Prairie Smoke  
Liatris spicata - Dense Blazing Star  
Lobelia cardinalis - Cardinal Flower

Lobelia siphilitica - Great Blue Lobelia (Blue Lobelia)  
Monarda fistulosa - Wild Bergamot (Purple Bee Balm)  
Oligoneuron ohioense - Ohio Goldenrod  
Rudbeckia hirta - Black-Eyed Susan  
Rudbeckia laciniata - Cut-Leaved Coneflower  
Solidago caesia - Blue-Stemmed Goldenrod  
Symphyotrichum laeve - Smooth Blue Aster  
Symphyotrichum lateriflorum - Calico Aster  
Symphyotrichum novae-angliae - New England Aster (pink)  
Symphyotrichum novae-angliae - New England Aster (purple)  
Symphyotrichum urophyllum - Arrow-Leaved Aster  
Verbena hastata - Blue Vervain (Blue Verbena)  
Zizia aurea - Golden Alexanders
